### Rebuilding the Beef Herd Program—November 20

In January 2012 the Texas beef cow inventory was 660,000 cows smaller than it was a year before, due largely to the historic drought of 2011. Although 2012 and 2013 were somewhat better than 2011, beef cow numbers in Texas and across the US remain close to all-time lows...and market prices are charting record highs.

The smaller cow inventory combined with high input costs, competing uses for land, prices of competing meats and radical changes in grain use are reshaping the beef business. Those with serious intent to enter, rebuild, or expand their beef operation can't wait till "normal" rains come and pastures are completely healed to develop a plan. A plan must be in place when the opportunity presents itself.

It is with this in mind that the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service developed the Rebuilding the Beef Herd program. <u>This program will be held in Paris at the Love Civic Center on Wednesday</u>, <u>November 20</u>. Cattlemen in Lamar and surrounding counties are invited to attend.

This will be an extensive day-long program to address several issues associated with the current climate in the beef cattle industry.

### 8:30 am Beef-Better (and different) Times Ahead

Demand vs. supply is shedding bright light on beef's future, but most agree the future will be significantly different than even the recent past. Relatively recent changes in grain and land use, ever increasing input costs and marginal profits could shape demographics in the beef industry for the next two decades. Here's a review that puts them all in perspective.

### 9:30 am Forage Recovery & Pasture Restocking

When it rains, drought-stricken warm-season forages must be allowed to rebound either from root reserves or seed while resource managers begin to restock with cattle. Flexibility has been and will continue to be an essential element. This discussion will focus on the art and science of balancing grazing pressure and forage supply.

### 10:30 am Evaluating Replacement Options

What type of cow best fits the new production paradigms? In this review of critical considerations like mature size, environmental adaptability and market acceptance, cattlemen may find answers to questions such as: "What might I buy?", "Can I find them?" and "How concerned should I be about health issues?".

### 2:30 pm Flexibility in Resource Use

Natural resource stewards realize production conditions change, forage supply is not constant and animal inventory needs some 'flex' built in. Continuing on from the morning's last discussion, here's a detailed look at resource inventory and replacement female options and how to strategically build flexibility into your operation.

### 3:30 pm Leased Grazing—What, Why and How

Every longstanding grazing lease involves a content lessor and successful lessee; that relationship has several key elements- resource inventory, lease expectations, structure, arrangement, tenure and documentation. Looking for country or cattle to graze grass you own? Then you'll want to sit in on this session.



### NE Texas Farm & Ranch Pesticide Applicator Clinic—December 10

The annual NE Texas Farm & Ranch Pesticide Applicator Clinic will be held Tuesday, December 10 at the Love Civic Center in Paris. This program is sponsored each year by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Lamar, Red River, Fannin and Delta Counties.

Registration begins at 7:30 am with the program beginning at 8:30 am.

Speakers will include: Lynn Angell with Monsanto—Management of Herbicide Resistant Weeds. This will include discussion of current and future technologies for weed control; Dr. Allen Knutson, Extension Entomologist— Management of Grasshoppers in Pastures; Dr. Mark Matocha, Extension Specialist — Texas Pesticide Laws and Regulations Update; Ken Adams, TDPS—Texas CDLs and Farm Vehicle Compliance; Dr. Sonja Swiger, Extension Entomologist—External Parasite Control on Cattle; Steve Upson, Noble Foundation—Management of Native & Improved Pecans.

This program has been approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture for CEUs in the following categories. 1 L&R, 3 IPM, 1 GEN. CEUs are good for recertification of Private, Non-Commercial, and Commercial licenses with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A registration fee of \$30 is payable at the door. This includes the noon meal.
